DEADLINE

All artwork being submitted to state contests must be received by January 10, 2023.

ELIGIBILITY

Youths, ages 6 – 17, are encouraged to participate in the contest, even if they are related to officials or employees of NASA, FAI, or any of its member organizations.

• Group I — Junior Category

(Date of birth between 1 January, 2013 and 31 December, 2016)

• Group II — Intermediate Category

(Date of birth between 1 January, 2009 and 31 December, 2012)

• Group III — Senior Category

(Date of birth between 1 January, 2005 and 31 December, 2008)

CONTEST LEVELS STATE AWARDS

Entries in each age group are judged and state winners and runners-up are selected.

Winners receive recognition from their state. The top three entries in each age group are forwarded to Washington, D.C. to be judged in the national competition.

NATIONAL AWARDS

The 1st, 2nd and 3rd place national winners from each age group are selected from the state submissions. All national winning artwork is forwarded to FAI for the international competition.

INTERNATIONAL AWARDS

National winners are forwarded to FAI headquarters.

ART SUBMISSION RULES

All children in the age groups shown below are encouraged to participate in the contest, even if they are related to officials or employees of the FAI or any of its member organizations. Participation in the national contests is limited to residents of that country.

FORMAT

The required format is 11 3/4 X 16 1/2 inches or the nearest possible equivalent. Artwork must not be framed or outlined with borders.

MEDIUM

All artwork must be done by hand (or, in the case of handicapped children, by foot or mouth). Any of the following media are permitted:

- Watercolor
- Oil paint
- Felt-tip pens
- Indelible ink
- Acrylic
- Indelible marker pens
- Soft ball-point pens
- Crayola/similar indelible medium

The following media are NOT permitted:

- No pencil, charcoal or other non-permanent medium may be used.
- No computer-generated artwork is permitted.
- No collage work involving the use of photo copies is permitted.

MARKINGS

The following details should be clearly shown on the back of art:

- Title • Family name • Given name
 - Post address • Email address
- Date of birth (Month/Day/Year)
 - Country of residence
- Name and address of child's school
 - Certificate of Authenticity

TITLE

There is no need for a title on the poster and entrants can decide for themselves whether or not to include one; however, there should be a clearly recognizable link to the contest theme.
